Dear Parents and carers

It has been a pleasure this week for me to spend time in lessons looking at teaching and learning. The standards of effort and PRiDe behaviours has been high. This year we have been focusing on providing more opportunities for students to be actively engaged in their learning, for greater challenge to be given to students and for teachers to check on the learning as the lesson progresses. Through regular quality assurance of lessons, leaders have been able to identify where best practice exists in these things and to share this more widely; to ensure greater consistency.

This week we have seen a drop in temperatures, so it is a good time to ask for your support with winter clothing. Students should be coming to college with coats; some of our buildings have very poor insulation and the temperatures can be low. Teachers can use their discretion to allow students to wear coats in colder classrooms during lesson time. Although students can come to college in hats and scarves, and can wear these when outside, we expect students to remove these inside the buildings. We do not permit hoodies, and these should not be worn as a substitute for a coat. We will confiscate hoodies when we see them because we do not want them to become fashion trend which young people feel they need to wear to conform to a clique's view of what is fashionable.

On the subject of uniform, the government has just published its guidance to schools for ensuring that school uniforms are affordable for families. From September 2026, schools must limit the number of compulsory branded items to three (four if a tie is one of them.) A branded item is one that, due to its colour, design, fabric

or other distinctive characteristic, is only available from the school's appointed uniform suppliers. At Wyvern, we have three compulsory branded items:

1. The tie
2. Either the jumper or the blazer
3. The PE sports top.

The skirt is also branded but is not compulsory as students can wear trousers instead. The rest of the uniform: shirts, trousers, PE shorts can be purchased from supermarkets and other shops. Although we do not need to make changes to comply with the new government guidance, we appreciate that there are families who struggle to afford it. The Wyvern uniform items are good quality and very durable; as such they can be worn smartly when second hand. We are very grateful to families who donate uniform items they no longer need because we pass these onto other families. We still have a lot of second-hand stock so if you need assistance, please do let us know. To further make uniform affordable, we have arranged for a second supplier to sell the branded items.

Vaping has become increasingly common among pre-teenage children, and we have seen a worrying trend of students joining the college already used to vaping. E-cigarettes are not safe for children or young people. The rise in brightly packaged, sweet flavours has made them appealing to young people, despite the health risks. Vaping is frequently shown on TikTok, Snapchat and Instagram, making it appear fun, fashionable and normal (and therefore safe). Research shows that more young people are experimenting with these each year. Although often marketed as "safer than smoking", vapes still carry serious risks:

- **Nicotine addiction:** many vapes contain high levels of nicotine which can cause dependency and affect brain development in young people.
- **Harmful chemicals:** vapes can contain toxic substances such as formaldehyde, acrolein and metals like lead. These can damage lungs and the cardiovascular system.
- **Respiratory effects:** vaping can irritate airways, trigger asthma and cause long-term problems.
- **Unregulated products:** some disposable vapes, especially those bought online or from informal sellers exceed the legal nicotine levels or contain banned substances. This can include THC.

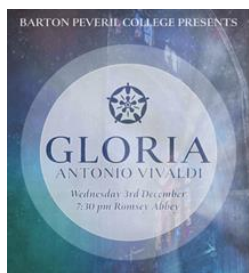
It is illegal to sell vapes or e-cigarettes to anyone under the age of 18. It is also illegal for adults to buy vapes on behalf of under-18s. At Wyvern, we treat vaping on site in the same way as smoking – it is strictly prohibited and students who repeatedly do it will be suspended. At the same time, we are keen to work with young people and their families to support them giving up vaping.

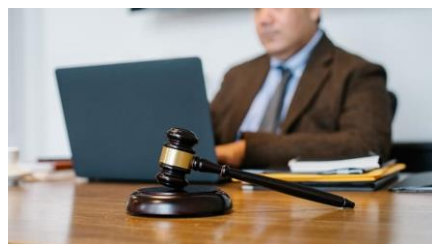
ROMSEY ABBEY CHRISTMAS CONCERT

Some of our Year 10 Creative iMedia students enjoyed an exceptional behind-the-scenes experience at Warner Bros. Studios this week, including rare access to one of the studio's "dailies cinemas" —the screening rooms normally used to view daily rushes during film production. Sitting in the same seats used by top filmmakers gave students a unique understanding of how scenes are reviewed, refined, and approved.
