Dear parents and carers,

Charlie and the Chocolate Factory

This week we are very proud to present the production of Charlie and the Chocolate Factory. The students have been rehearsing for months and have put a tremendous amount of thought, effort and care to perfect their roles. I am so proud of them! I am also incredibly grateful to the staff who have made the production possible: led by Miss Chatterly and Miss Wood, our curriculum leaders for Drama and Music, but also their colleagues in the Drama, Music, Art, Textiles teams as well as the support staff. Although the story was written over sixty years ago, its advice on how to parent, educate and teach children remains as important and relevant today as ever.

One of the most powerful lessons is the importance of setting boundaries and teaching children about the consequences of their actions. This theme is woven throughout the story, especially in the characters of the other children who, unlike Charlie, have no respect for limits and suffer the repercussions of their indulgence. Augustus's overeating, Veruca's tantrums, Violet's obsession with winning at all cost and Mike's addiction to technology all lead to their downfall. These children have been brought up without boundaries and have become selfish and entitled as a result. The adults in their lives have given in to their demands and indulged their wishes. This has made them think they have a right to do whatever they want, when they want. In the factory, they react with rudeness and hostility when Willy Wonka sets rules. They and their parents regard rules, boundaries and consequences as an infringement on their rights. As a result, these children cannot manage their impulses, have no self-control and are incapable of behaving in socially acceptable ways.

As children grow into teenagers, they seek greater independence. Many will see boundaries and rules as restrictions or limitations; as adult attempts to control their lives. Responsible adults don't just let children do whatever they want. They set and maintain boundaries to give them the security of knowing what to expect and what's expected of them in life, in the workplace and in relationships. This clarity helps them develop confidence, emotional regulation, and the ability to make thoughtful decisions. The story of Charlie and the Chocolate Factory teaches us that without boundaries children start believing that the world revolves around them and their desires, and when they don't get what they want, they become frustrated, demanding, and ultimately, unhappy. By teaching children the importance of respecting limits and understanding the consequences of their actions, we are helping them build self-discipline, respect for others, and a strong moral compass. These are the gifts that will serve them well throughout their lives.

Behaviour Support

We are very fortunate that the large majority of parents support the college's boundaries and rules and replicate positive and negative consequences at home for good and poor behaviour at college. We know that some students find it much harder to do this than others. Our behaviour support staff have developed a series of interventions to help these students. They run the following programmes:

- The social, emotional and communication programme, which focuses on self-awareness, self-esteem, body language, conversational skills, friendship skills, and assertiveness. Individual needs are assessed, and the programme is personalised to students based on need.
- The understanding and managing emotions programme which helps students engage in self-reflection, to examine their thoughts and feelings that lead to angry emotions and learn effective tools and techniques to manage anger.
- The respect and responsibility programme which empowers students to explore respect, responsibility, and healthy relationships. It fosters self-awareness, empathy, and integrity, equipping participants to make positive choices and impact their communities.
- The Resolving Conflict Programme helps children manage friendships and peer conflicts effectively. It provides a clear framework to understand peer dynamics, address issues like exclusion and breakdowns in communication, and develop skills to build positive relationships.
- The Think, Reflect, Respect Programme educates students on prejudice, challenging biases, and understanding their impact.

Safeguarding: E-scooters

We have seen a few students using E-scooters on site after the end of the college day and we have had our first students coming to college on them. E-scooters are classed as motor vehicles under the Road Traffic Act 1988. That means users need things like a driver's licence, tax, insurance and registration – which privately owned scooters don't have. Because of this, it's illegal for anyone (including children) to ride a privately owned e-scooter on public roads, pavements, cycle lanes, parks or other public spaces. Any use of private e-scooters must be on private land (like a garden or private driveway) with the landowner's permission – this is lawful for children of any age.

The only public exceptions to e-scooter use are official rental e-scooter schemes (trial schemes in some towns and cities). These are legal on public roads in those areas for people with a full or provisional UK driving licence. Why are the laws so restrictive? Because there are many safeguarding risks. E-scooters can be difficult for young riders to control and offer very little protection in the event of a fall. Local road conditions add to the risk. Many streets and paths have uneven surfaces, potholes, or raised curbs, and e-scooters' small wheels make them especially unstable on these surfaces. Even a minor bump can cause a sudden loss of balance, leading to injuries. Emergency services have also reported an increase in fires linked to faulty or damaged e-scooter batteries, particularly when they are charged indoors or overnight.




VOCAL FESTIVAL 2026

Teamwork was a strong theme throughout the weekend, with students sharing responsibilities, encouraging one another, and keeping morale high from start to finish.

This weekend provided valuable practice in:

- Map reading and navigation
- What to do if they walk off their planned route

- Decision-making within a team

A few missed turns and discussion about where on the map they were, a group did wander off course (with staff supervision!)— an ideal learning opportunity. They put their training into action by stopping, assessing their surroundings, identifying landmarks, and safely returning to their mapped route. A great example of independence and problem-solving in a real expedition setting.

To break up the miles, there were plenty of games — with *many* rounds of Imposter being played. It kept everyone entertained and brought lots of laughter to the day.

We are incredibly proud of all students for their positive attitude, teamwork, and resilience. They have made an excellent start to their expedition preparation, and we're looking forward to seeing them develop further as we head toward the qualifying expedition later this year.
