Dear parents and carers,

Following the General Election last year, the new government asked a panel of experts to review the curriculum in England's schools, including how students' learning is assessed. Although the review panel is not yet ready to publish its findings and recommendations, it has this week published a report on its progress so far. Having identified the issues, they want to address in this interim report, the panel will now spend the next few months looking at possible solutions to these and making recommendations to the government. I thought I would give you a short summary of what has been said in the interim report around the four identified areas or issues they want to tackle, as we can expect changes to these areas in the next couple of years.

Issue 1: an education system that works for all

The review starts by saying that the last government's curriculum changes led to a significant improvement in standards of education when comparing students' levels of literacy, numeracy and knowledge with students in other countries. However, it points out that beneath this headline, there are significant differences or "gaps" between the performance of different groups of students, in particular much lower attainment by children with special needs and those from a background of economic disadvantage.

Issue 2: the shape and content of the curriculum

The review is looking at how schools ensure students have a broad curriculum (studying a wide range of subjects) whilst also ensuring students study subjects in proper depth. It has highlighted several areas where this balance between breadth and depth is not being achieved. It says that at primary school, students are being taught core subjects in depth, but this has meant they do not get to study a broad enough range of subjects. It says that the transition from Year 6 to Year 7 needs to be managed better as students often repeat in Year 7 what they have studied in Year 6. It says that some schools begin to prepare students for GCSE exams in year 9, reducing the range of subjects they study in year 9. It says that the GCSE exam courses for many subjects contain too much content, which means schools do not make time to teach non-exam subjects like RPS and PE properly in Years 10-11. The panel is looking to see if the number of exams sat for each GCSE can be reduced whilst not affected the reliability of the grades given.

Issue 3: a curriculum "fit for the future".

The review expresses concern that the curriculum has not kept up with developments in the modern world and therefore does not include important things students should know. There should be a greater focus on digital and media literacy, artificial intelligence and more of a focus on sustainability and climate science. There should be more focus on making subjects relevant to the real world of work. More work needs to be done on diversity in the curriculum so that discrimination is tackled. There is currently no nationally agreed content for RE and for relationships and sex education which has led to big variations in the quality of these subjects across the country.

Issue 4: curriculum and qualification for 16-19 year olds.

The report says that A-Levels are working well but that 18-year-olds do not always have the knowledge and skills to thrive in life and work. It says the purpose of some vocational courses which are alternatives to A-Level can be unclear to employers. It says that students who do not get a grade 4 or higher in GCSE resits in English and Maths in Year 11 should re-sit them in Year 12 but that current arrangements for this to happen have not improved students grades from when they took them in Year 11.

Safeguarding: Echo Chambers

An echo chamber is an online forum where a person only encounters information or opinions that reflect and reinforce their own. Website owners and social media platforms have realised that people want to interact with others who sound like them and think like them. Children are spending time in echo chambers: forums where their own views are echoed, reinforced and built on without being challenged.

Children naturally tend to enjoy a diverse range of interests. Echo chambers can funnel their attention down a restricted path. More than 500 hours of new content is uploaded to YouTube every minute which is over 80 years' worth of material every day. Algorithms push people towards familiar faces and favoured themes. Echo chambers can present rumour as fact, spread misinformation and disseminate fake news.

Even adult social media threads can quickly turn into echo chambers, where a dominate person or group attracts agreement while those who disagree either don't contribute or get criticised for doing so. If you notice your child seems to be watching content from the same small number of accounts all the time, then it's a sign that your child is accessing a narrow and restricted diet of information which could blinker their worldview and make them intolerant of those who have a different outlook or perspective. The danger is they become angry or aggressive towards those who say things they don't like. Students need the life skills of being able to empathise with others, to resolve conflict and to respect those they encounter who are different to them.

If you become concerned by the amount of time your child is spending on certain websites or social media platforms then you could talk to them about setting time limits. You can maintain these limits using the parental control options on their devices. You can use the settings on individual apps to avoid echo chambers. Twitter's default setting is to show tweets it thinks users will like first; YouTube automatically plays its next "recommended" video selected by an algorithm based on what the user has watched previously. But both these settings can be adjusted. We can and should challenge what our children think and say, rather than reinforcing it.

The journalist Sydney Harris said, "the whole purpose of education is to turn mirrors into windows." What he meant was that the whole purpose of education, is to stop children turning inwards and to help them look outwards; to see beyond themselves; to see more than just the immediate current state of their life; to open up possibilities for them, to show them what the world has to offer, to widen their horizons, to introduce them to different ideas, beliefs and experiences than those they currently know. If mirrors are social media sites that make them dwell on themselves and their current issues, problems and worries, then windows are the experiences they have in school and in extracurricular activities that make them look out, beyond their current self to the future.
