Dear Parents and carers

Tomorrow is World Mental Health Day. So, this week we reflect on the importance of good mental health and how we can achieve it. Research by the charity MIND found that 1 in 4 people - 25% will experience a mental health problem of some kind each year in England and that 1 in 6 adults experience a mental health issue in any given week in England. 1 in 5 secondary school students - 20% - suffer poor mental health each year. The research shows that children will often struggle with anxiety, depression, burn out, trauma, loneliness, self-hate and feelings of anger, guilt or shame that they struggle to manage.

For good physical health, the NHS recommends 5 portions of fresh fruit or vegetables every day to get the nutrients our bodies need to be healthy, but the NHS also recommends that we do 5 activities to get the "happy hormones" that we need for good mental health: dopamine, endorphins serotonin and oxytocin. Students in years 8-11 have had assemblies on these 4 chemicals and how they can help prevent poor mental health and how they can be part of the response to tackling mental health problems.

Dopamine, the "feel good hormone", plays a significant role in helping students feel motivated, determined, concentrate and focus. Serotonin regulates mood, sleep, energy, emotions and the nervous system. Endorphins are mood booster and pain killers, reducing anxiety, worry and nervousness and helping students feel relaxed, confident and calmer. Oxytocin promotes feelings of trust, empathy, compassion and connection to others. When students make healthy lifestyle choices, their bodies will produce the 4 happy hormones, and it is the NHS's five "winning ways to wellbeing" that define what this healthy lifestyle is:



Our advice to students therefore is to: exercise, socialise, meditate, eat well, sleep, go outside into the daylight, breathe deeply, laugh, help people, perform music, be creative, spend time on hobbies and interests, learn new things, be active.

Many people ask why mental health problems were so rare, so unheard of, in children for decades and then why, in the last 15 years we have seen so many mental health problems in young people. There are lots of reasons for that and of course one is that there was a stigma to talking about mental health. But one of the main reasons is that children had different lifestyles then than they do now. The activities they did more of back then, which children do a lot less of now, actually make the body produce the 4 happy hormones that create good mental health.

In the last couple of newsletters I have shared with you details of the extra-curricular and super-curricular activities that we offer at Wyvern, which provide the opportunity for students to do things that will involve them in activities that boost the 4 happy hormones.

This could be a great opportunity for creative students to get involved with the community through writing a poem or story (max 500 words), painting, or drawing.

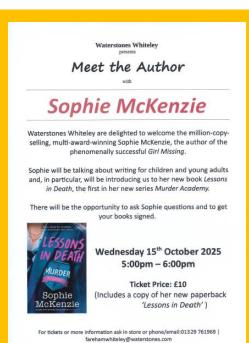

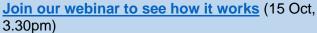

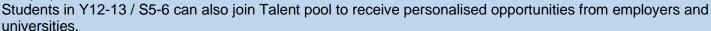

If you wish to arrange an application workshop on this side of term, please do not hesitate to reach out. We will continue to monitor application numbers from your school.

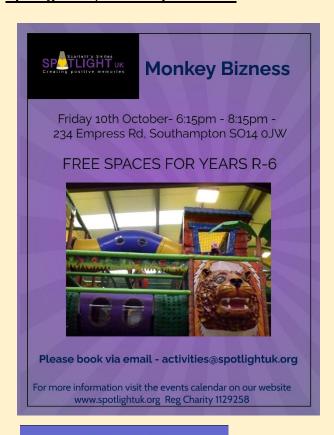

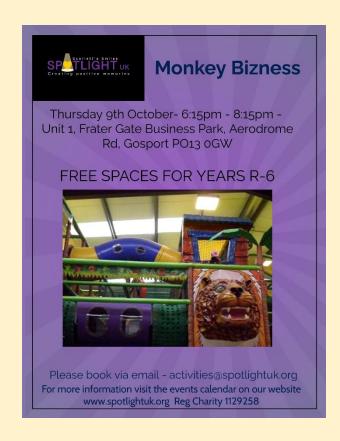

This week shines a light on the vital role of kinship carers, those raising a child of a family member or a friend, who provide over 141,000 children in England and Wales with loving and stable homes. This includes grandparents, aunts, uncles, siblings, and family friends - who step up in extraordinary ways to keep children connected to their families, roots and communities.

To mark the occasion Wyvern hosted its first ever Kinship Care Café at the Fountain Café, offering a chance for kinship carers and their children to come together to celebrate the conversations, the friendships, and the shared understanding from being in the same boat.

Your child's annual Nasal Flu Vaccination is now due. The vaccine helps protect against flu, which can be a serious or life-threatening illness. The vaccine will help your child to build up immunity which means your child will be better able to fight off flu.

To opt for the porcine gelatine free inactive flu injection, select NO to the nasal flu immunisation and you will be given further options.
