

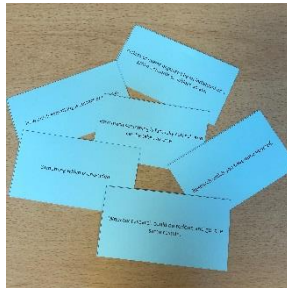

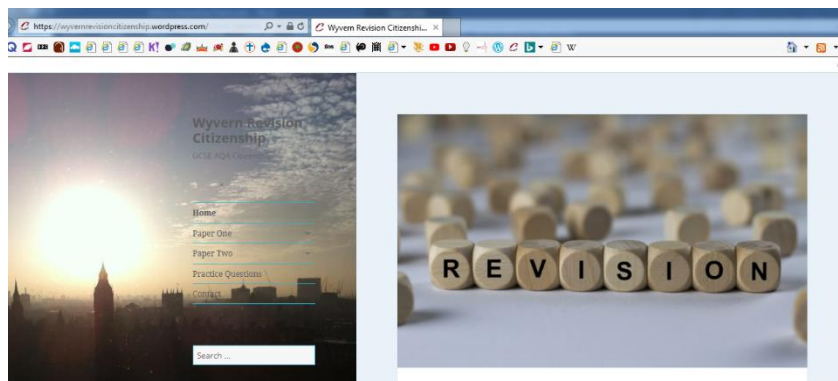

## How to revise

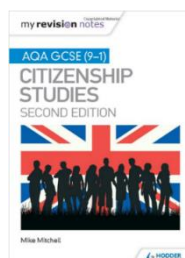
- 1) Spend time using your flashcards to revise key words and their meanings. You can get your parents or a friend to test you too.
