Assessment

Your learning will be assessed formatively as you practise, develop and refine your skills, technique, tactics, sequences and compositions.

You will receive verbal feedback and some peer evaluations.

You will also receive an end of unit summative assessment to assess your ability to perform in a competitive, game situation (as appropriate) or to perform your movement and sequence in front of the whole class or peers.



Home Learning

Homework is not set on a regular basis in Core PE, although you might be asked to research an aspect of PE & Sport.

There is no examination for Core PE, but you can further your knowledge and understanding by taking an active part in the college extra-curricular programme.

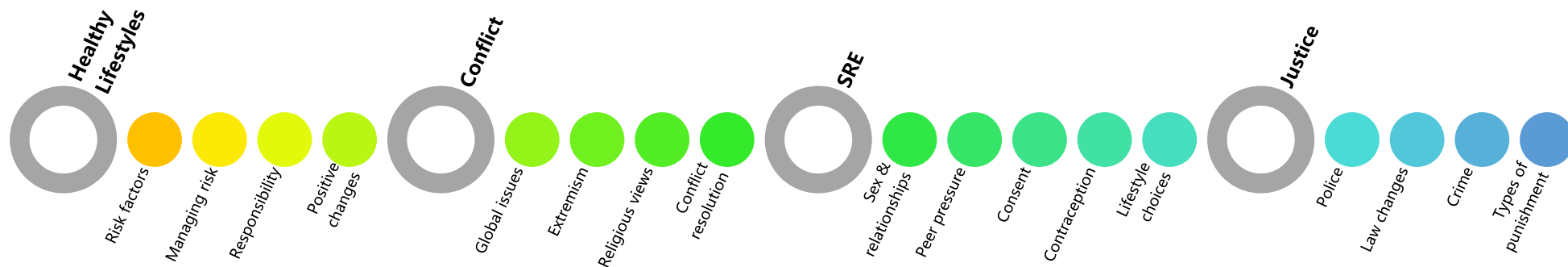
Find an activity and sport that you like and do more. Look at the clubs list and illustrated programme that can be found on your tutor notice board and come along.

Extra-Curricular Enrich Your Learning

-  Attend and commit to one or more of the PE after college activities that are offered throughout the year

Assessment

You will complete a formative piece of writing on the impact of a healthy/unhealthy lifestyle.

Using a mastery grid, you will be assessed on your ability to understand key terms, recognise and evaluate different viewpoints and complete an extended writing task on whether war can ever be justified and whether capital punishment should be reintroduced to the UK.

You will complete a careers' booklet linked to the Conflict unit.



Revision Tips

Make sure you revise the meaning and spelling of key terms.

If you want extra support, speak to your teacher for a revision support sheet.

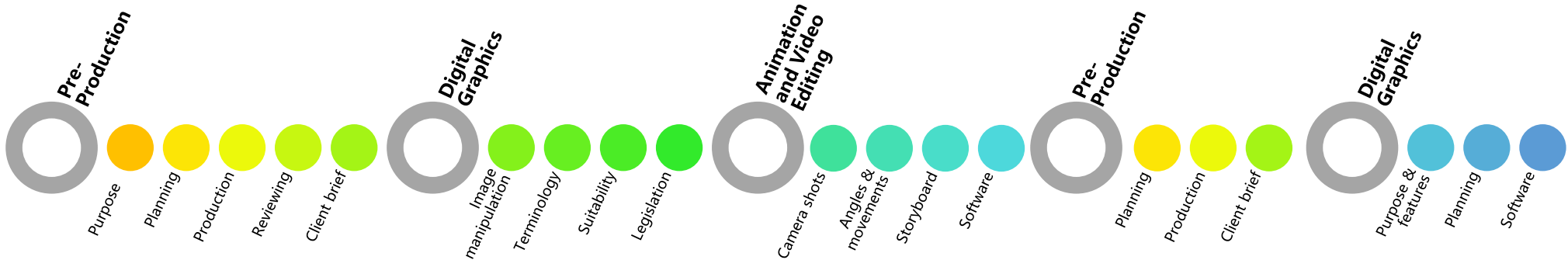

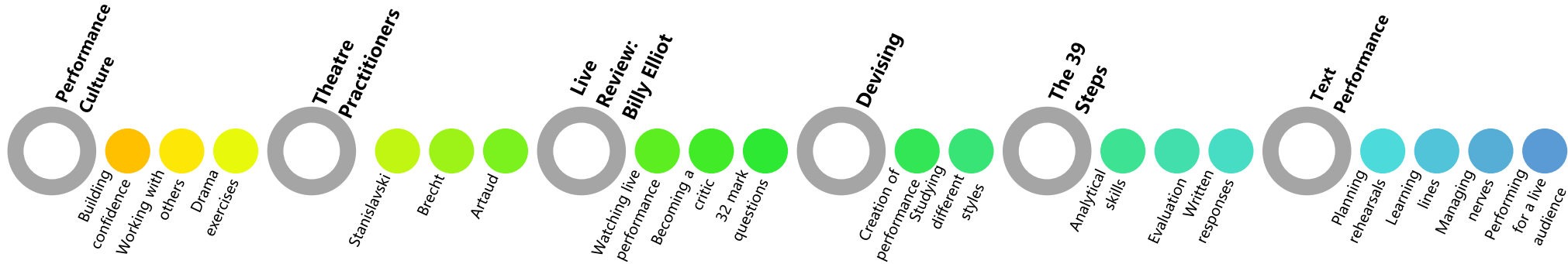

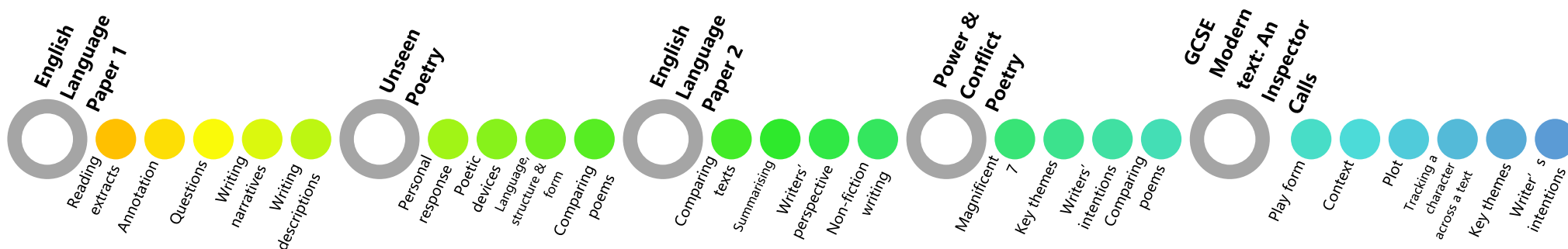

Learning Journey



Assessment

Your learning will be assessed through verbal feedback in class, peer and self-assessment, and through formative written targets in your exercise book from your class teacher. These comments will cover your successful learning and skills, will identify areas for improvement, and recognise sustained and improved effort, and/or comment on your presentation of work.

Formal assessment will take place to evaluate your reading and writing skills across the year.



Home Learning

You will be set a weekly task in designated Homework booklets, or specific tasks linked to in-class learning.

You are also expected to read your own choice of reading book for at least 20 minutes per day (if possible).



Revision Tips

Try explaining your ideas or response to someone else – if you can 'teach them' the skill or topic, then you 'know' the ideas well.

Read and re-read a text to ensure you have understood it. Summarise the text in 5 to 10 sentences to pick out the most important ideas.

Create mind-maps or cue cards for key ideas, characters and events in a text so you can refer back to these when reading a longer text.

Extra-Curricular Enrich Your Learning

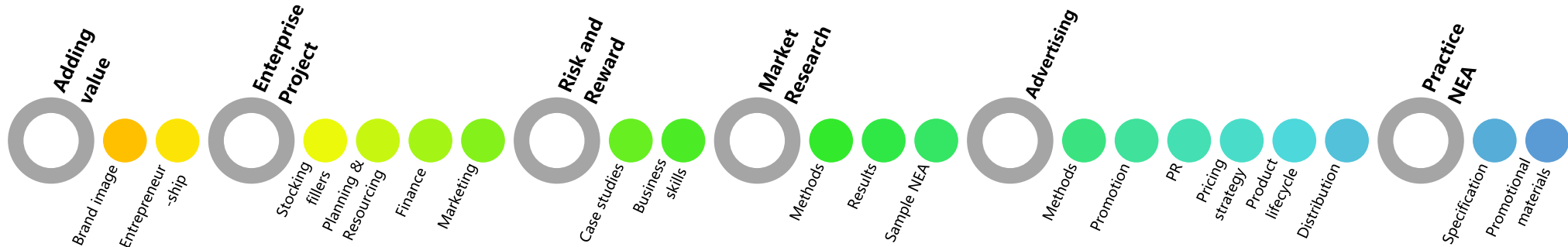
-  Ensure you are completing 20 mins of personal reading each day.
-  Read a range of biographies, diaries, articles and translated texts- ask the school librarians for help to find books to read, or your local library
-  Use sites such as BBC Bitesize to test and learn a range of broader ideas for your related topics
-  Research and read other texts written by the authors/writers you are studying in class
-  Create your own series of cue cards, revision notes and knowledge organisers for your text and/or topic
-  Volunteer to read aloud in class- practise this at home to ensure you read with fluency and intonation, and you create an effective narrative voice
-  Practise writing creatively for non-fiction and fiction tasks. Revisit and edit your own writing, experimenting with vocabulary, form and structure

Super-Curriculum Extend Your Learning

-  Join and regularly visit a library. Challenge yourself to read a wide variety of genres and authors including fiction and non-fiction
-  Research the historical periods and places from your texts and books in class. What else could you learn about the people, places and events of these times?
-  Read a range of texts which explore related issues in society. Look for other texts and articles which explore a range of experiences across time and place
-  Go to local museums, theatre productions and galleries. Try to make connections between fact and fiction, art and history
-  Join a pupil Book Group or Creative Writing Club. Enter writing competitions online and in school
-  Respond creatively to your topic by exploring the themes and ideas in a range of ways- art, music, writing or article writing

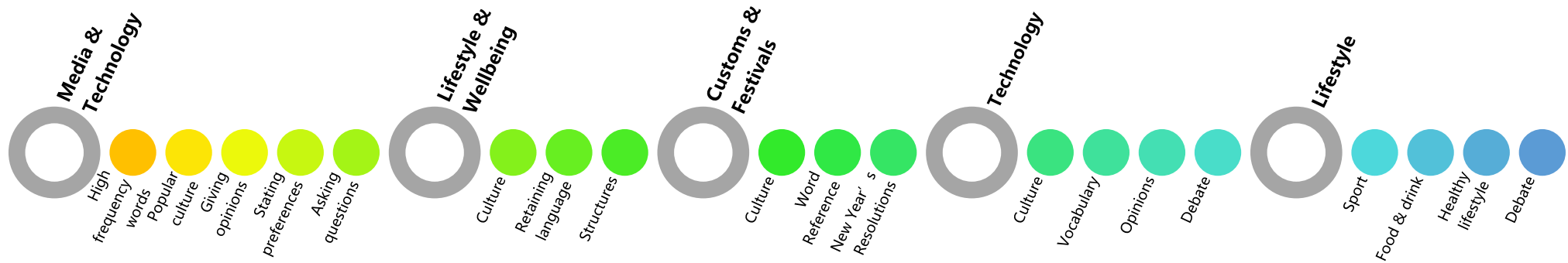

Learning Journey



Assessment

You will regularly be assessed on key vocabulary and the non-negotiables.

Your teacher will also assess your learning regularly during in-class activities and you will get lots of verbal feedback too.

Your written work will be checked for accuracy.

You will be assessed three times a year on listening, reading and writing and you will get targets for improvement.



Home Learning

You will be set regular homework including learning, practising and revisiting vocabulary on platforms such as Memrise, Quizlet, Linguagenut, TaskMagic and Blooket.

You will be encouraged to do this little and often to embed vocabulary in long term memory.

We expect students to work independently on homework each week.



Revision Tips

Each morning students complete a uniform and equipment check; the college bulletin is read, informing students of room changes and detention notifications, and rewards and achievements are shared.

In addition to this, students have the following sessions each week:

- This is a chance for tutors to follow up with their tutees regarding pastoral and academic concerns or achievements
